In our assembly this week we marked Dr Martin Luther King Jr. Day which is celebrated on the third Monday of January each year, marking the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., a pivotal leader in the American civil rights movement. Dr. King is renowned for his role in advocating for racial equality through nonviolent resistance and his famous "I Have a Dream" speech delivered during the 1963 March on Washington.

The Bronze Rights Respecting Schools Award

The Bronze Rights Respecting Schools Award is an initial recognition granted to schools that are beginning their journey towards becoming a Rights Respecting School. This award is part of a program developed by UNICEF UK to promote children's rights in schools across the UK. Achieving the Bronze Award means that a school has made a commitment to place the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) at the heart of its ethos and curriculum. At this stage, the school demonstrates an understanding of children's rights and has started to integrate these principles into its policies, practices, and relationships. The aim is to create a respectful and inclusive school environment where every child is valued and empowered to become an active participant in their communi-ty.
